

Sunday's Gospel

Taken from the Gospel for 13th November (Luke 21:5-19): Perseverance

When some were talking about the Temple, remarking how it was adorned with ne stonework and votive offerings, Jesus said, "All these things you are staring at now - the time will come when not a single stone will be left on another: everything will be destroyed." And they put to him this question: "Master," they said, "when will this happen, then, and what sign will there be that this is about to take place?" "Take care not to be deceived," he said, "because many will come using my name and saying, 'I am he' and 'The time is near at hand'. Refuse to join them. And when you hear of wars and revolutions, do not be frightened, for this is something that must happen but the end is not so soon." Then he said to them, "Nation will ght against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. There will be great earthquakes and plagues and famines here and there; there will be fearful sights and great signs from heaven. But before all this happens, men will seize you and persecute you; they will hand you over to the synagogues and to imprisonment, and bring you before kings and governors because of my name - and that will be your opportunity to bear witness. Keep this carefully in mind: you are not to prepare your defence, because I myself shall give you an eloquence and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to resist or contradict. You will be betrayed even by parents and brothers, relations and friends; and some of you will be put to death. You will be hated by all men on account of my name, but not a hair of your head will be lost. Your endurance will win you your lives."

Sunday's Gospel Relfection by Fr Henry Wansbrough

Luke was writing his gospel after the devastation of Jerusalem by the Roman armies in 70 AD, and the way he frames the words of Jesus suggests that he had witnessed the devastation. Massive blocks of stone, thrown down from the walls, are still lying there as they fell, scattered at the base of the Temple. The message of this passage is, then, the same as Paul's in today's second reading: the end is sure, but is not yet. Jesus prepares his followers for what is to come before the cataclysmic fi nale. He warns against false Messiahs, political leaders or other saviour-fi gures who claim to 'put the world to rights'. His followers will be continually challenged to give an account of their beliefs, harassed and martyred in every age, betrayed by those they thought their friends. There is a promise that Jesus will provide the words and wisdom for Christians to make a reply to their persecutors; there is a promise too of protection from real harm - but there is no promise that it will be a quiet and easy life. A constant theme in Luke's Good News is that the followers of Jesus must follow him in his diffi culties and trials. Only with like endurance will they stay true to him and keep in his footsteps.



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Online life and offline life is just life....

For many of us, we see our online lives and offline lives as different, but children are growing up with technology and the internet and for them there isn't a difference; online life and offline life is just life.

Technology can move at an extraordinarily fast pace and it can be difficult to know how to start talking to your child about what they're doing online, who they might be speaking to or discussing the potential risks and issues. Talking regularly with your child is the greatest tool to help keep them safe online. Talking regularly and making it part of daily conversation, like you would about their day at school, will help your child feel relaxed. It also means when they do have any worries, they're more likely to come and speak to you. But it can also be easy to become overwhelmed with the different technology, the language that children use, the huge number of games and apps which are available and the potential risks.

What are the risks for children online?

There are potential risks for children online. Consider these things when you talk with your child about what they're doing online:

What they might see? When they're playing a game, using an app, watching YouTube channels, what sort of content is there? Have they seen any inappropriate content and if so, what did they do? How did it make them feel?

Who they might speak to? Most games and social media apps have various communications features, from text chat to voice chat, messaging and private messaging, video and image sharing, livestreaming and more. Ask about the friends they play with. What is the difference between online and offline friends? Is your child talkining to people they don't know online? If so, why and what are they sharing?

How they behave? When they play those games or use those apps, what is their behaviour? Do they feel anxious? Do they sometimes get angry, e.g. playing fast-paced games and constantly losing?



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Next steps to take

Having a conversation with your child can give you a good insight into their online activities so that you can consider:

- Are further options, such as parental controls, are required?
- Are the <u>games</u> and apps they're using appropriate to their age? Have a conversation and agree some rules with your child about what games and apps they're allowed to use. While there are risks with most online platforms, we'd recommend only letting your child use apps that have privacy settings and a 'report and block' feature.
- Do they know about the safety and privacy features of the apps they're using? Such as: -Privacy settings. Are their accounts public or private?

-Do they know how to block and report? Are those features available?

-Can you turn features off, such as chat and in-app purchases?

-Do they know what personal and private information is, and what is and is not appropriate to share online?

-What are their profiles on their games and apps? What does the profile say about them? --

- What does the image or avatar say about them?

<u>Step 3</u>: Children visit the Book Swap and exchange their book swap voucher for a book.

<u>Step 4</u>: Children take their new book home to enjoy.
